New Pilot Program to Help Condos Pay for Safety

A new pilot program just signed into law could provide critical help for the village's condominiums.

The new law

provides condo associations with inspections recommending mitigation improvements and the opportunity to apply for improvement grants.

The Safe Florida Condo Pilot Program, which becomes effective next month, is an initiative aimed at enhancing the structural safety and integrity of condominium buildings throughout Florida. This program was developed in response to the tragic collapse of the Champlain Towers South in Surfside, Florida, in June 2021, which

Deerfield Pier Closing for Over a Year

The Deerfield Beach
Fishing Pier will be
closing for up to a year and a
half for repairs and renovations,
according to city officials.


The city says the closure begins June 3rd and could last up to 18 months. In addition

to the pier, the adjacent parking lot will also be closed. The city says a "series of structural repairs and renovations" are needed. It says structural damage to the pier was discovered during recent inspections.

The damage was "more extensive than originally reported," according to the city

In addition to repairing structural damage, the city says it will also upgrade the pier with new railings, lighting, two new pavilions for shade and gathering space, improved fish-cutting stations,

informative signage, modern decking, and public art.

Worst Season Ever Predicted

A hurricane forecast released last month paints the most serious picture of hurricane season ever released in May.

The 2024 Atlantic hurricane season is forecasted to be particularly active and intense. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) predicts an 85% chance of an above-normal season, projecting between 17 to 25 named storms, 8 to 13 hurricanes, and 4 to 7 major hurricanes (Category 3 or higher).

Several climatic factors contribute to this heightened activity. A significant influence is the expected development of La Niña conditions, which typically reduce wind shear in the Atlantic, creating a more

conducive environment for hurricane formation and intensification. Additionally, the Atlantic Ocean's surface temperatures are near record highs, providing more energy to fuel storms. Reduced trade winds and an above-normal West African monsoon are also expected to contribute to increased storm activity.

This season is particularly notable as it features the

highest number of predicted storms ever issued in a May outlook by NOAA. Enhanced forecasting tools and models will be employed to provide more accurate predictions and timely warnings. For instance, NOAA will introduce new forecast models to improve hurricane intensity predictions and expand its communication efforts to include more

comprehensive advisories and multilingual updates.

With these conditions in place, coastal areas, especially in Texas, Florida, and the Carolinas, are at an elevated risk of hurricane impacts. Preparedness and timely response will be crucial in mitigating the potential damage from this active season.

resulted in the loss of 98 lives and brought to light significant concerns about the maintenance and safety of older residential buildings in the state.

The primary objective of the Safe Florida Condo Pilot Program is to prevent similar tragedies by ensuring that condominium buildings, particularly older ones, are structurally sound and well-maintained. The program specifically targets buildings that are over 30 years old. Century Village East just recently celebrated its 50th anniversary.

The goal is to identify any signs of deterioration, corrosion, or other issues that could compromise the building's integrity. Recognizing that the cost of inspections and repairs can be substantial, the Safe Florida Condo Pilot Program includes provisions for financial assistance. This assistance may come in the form of grants, low-interest loans, or other funding mechanisms designed to help condominium associations cover these expenses.

The bill places specific limits on grant awards. The limit for roof-related projects is set at \$11 per square foot times the square feet of the replacement roof, limited to \$1,000 per unit, and the maximum grant contribution is limited to 50 percent of the project. The limit for opening protection-related projects grant contribution

is a maximum of \$750 per replacement window, not to exceed \$1,500 per unit, and a maximum grant contribution of 50 percent of the project. The bill provides that an association may receive grant funds for both roof-related and opening protection-related projects, but the maximum grant contribution is limited to \$175,000 per association.



A Message from Marty Kiar, Your Property Appraiser

2024 Estimate of Taxable Values

The preliminary 2024 property values are now showing on our website at web.bcpa.net. Florida Statutes require our office use January 1 as the date of assessment each year. Our office must consider changes in market conditions – up or down - when developing the Just/Market Values each year. The 2024 Just Values are based on the market data from January 1, 2024 back through January 2, 2023 with January 1, 2024 as the date of assessment. If you purchased your property in 2024, your



2024 purchase price along with comparable market data from 2024 will be used in setting your property's 2025 Just/Market Value. Our office will mail the 2024 TRIM

(proposed tax) Notices to all Broward property owners in mid-August. This notice will show your property's 2024 Just Value, Assessed/Save Our Homes Value, all taxsaving exemptions you are receiving, and the proposed tax rates as set by the various taxing authorities listed on the notice.

Quarterly Tax Payment Installment Plan

While the Property Appraiser's Office does not set or collect taxes, our office receives many calls from residents inquiring about installment tax bills and their recently approved exemptions. Broward County's Records, Taxes & Treasury Division is responsible for the billing and collecting of property taxes.

For property owners on the 2024 installment payment plan, the first two installment payments (June 2024 and September 2024) are based on the previous (2023) tax year. This means residents who have been approved for 2024 Homestead Exemption or other exemptions will not see these 2024 exemptions on either the June or September installment bills. The final two installment bills (December 2024 and March 2025) will be adjusted to

include any 2024 exemptions or changes to the property's taxable value. The deadline to apply for Broward County's Installment Payment Plan was May 1, 2024. Should you have any questions regarding the payment of property taxes, the Tax Collector's Office can be reached at 954.357.4829 or by email to revenue@broward.org.

COOCVE President's Report

A good set of documents is meant to guide condominium owners and boards on what the associations' business is, how it should run, what each party's responsibilities are and what we all get and give up if we choose condo living. Condo docs (documents) represent the laws an association and its members agree to live by.

When we buy a condo unit, we sign a contract saying we read, understand and agree to follow the docs. Annually, when the association's board gets voted in, each director swears to do the same. When the association's board and its members/owners read, refer to and do their best to live by their docs, life in the condo is peaceful and pleasant. When an issue arises, the docs often



provide the resolution. If not, the board has the right to add a rule/regulation to its docs from time to time. Rules and regulations are considered the 4th in the set:

- the 4th in the set:
 1. Declaration of
- Condominium
 2. Articles of Incorporation
 - 3. By-Laws
- 4. Rules and Regulations (Unlike 1-3, requiring membership approval,

normally the Board has the right to prepare, vote on and pass rules in its meetings.)

Condo docs become outdated. If not amended over time, they more often will likely conflict with state law (FL Statute 718). If a section of the state law says something like, "unless your documents indicate otherwise", this means what the association's docs say about that issue takes precedent. If the statute doesn't say anything like that, state law takes precedent. Keeping docs amended over time to comply with state law is extremely helpful in knowing how and what association boards and member/owners should do and expect.

What we hear at COOCVE and know is common in

most other condo complexes like ours, is how few people, board members and owners/ members alike, ever read, refer to or even know where their docs are. That's unfortunate. Without using the docs consistently as the governing guidelines, it can make life often much more difficult for all involved. If you cannot find your documents, consider purchasing them.

When counting number of associations, we must take into consideration Swansea is one association that governs two high-rise buildings, giving us a total of 253 associations. Yes, it is confusing. "Thank you" to Michael Routberg, of Master Management, who after reading the article, shared information he learned while heading the CVE lighting project a few years ago. And "Thank you" to Robert Streather, of Master Management, for conducting a re-count, and confirming the old information we relied on for years was incorrect. Great to have CVE people we can count on to kindly and gently help us keep learning.

Feeding Wildlife Causes Problems

Please DO NOT feed the ducks or other wildlife in the pool areas or elsewhere in the Village. Feeding wildlife causes the animals to lose their fear of humans and they can become aggressive toward people in their search for handouts.

Ducks, in particular, are becoming accustomed to being fed by residents and will approach people demanding to be fed. Feeding them interferes with their natural diet and encourages them to remain in the area and continue to be a nuisance.

The end result is that they are making a mess everywhere including the pool areas. Duck feces is a health hazard and an inconvenience to everyone, particularly those who enjoy the pool facilities, as the pool area has to be closed, cleaned and the pool treated for feces.

Association DOCUMENT Project



COOCVE took a survey in April and learned 38 associations (14 rental and 24 non-rental) need to amend their documents and are interested in our DOCUMENT project. The finalized draft of the RESTATED standard documents (Articles, Declaration, By-Laws) is complete and we are in process of conducting our attorney search. The attorney's job will be to turn our drafts into legally sound instruments.

The standard sets (one for RENTAL and one for NON-RENTAL) are intended to:

- 1. Save associations money by adopting a standard set of documents rather than paying the premium cost to produce their own.
- 2. Remove all Demised Property/LEASE language.
- 3. Provide a current, clean restated set of documents conforming to FL.S. 718.
- 4. Meet most up to date and survey response language.
- 5. Allow for associations to customize their RULES & REGULATIONS to compensate for something they might want that is not in the standard set.

In the fall, when most have returned for season, we are working to have legally ready documents for association review. If we have a large enough number of associations wishing to present the standard set to their membership for approval, COOCVE is working to negotiate a reasonable cost for associations to have the docs personalized with their association's relevant requirements to send their members for their vote.

This project represents only one of the many ways COOCVE is working to provide education, research and recommendations on issues intended to improve overall quality of life in CVE. We proudly fund CIAC and several of our officers volunteer in that worthwhile effort as well. We strive to make a positive difference in our community.

Vote to Expand Nearby Landfill Delayed

he Broward County L Commission vote on whether to allow the landfill south of the village to expand has been delayed until after the summer.

Waste Management, which operates the landfill located on Powerline Road south of the village, is seeking permission to increase the height of the trash from 225 feet to 325 feet. The company is also seeking to expand the amount of land it can use for the landfill.

According to the city of Deerfield Beach, the requested expansions and growth would extend the life of the landfill by approximately 16

The city has been urging the public to oppose the expansions, saying "this is not a matter to be taken lightly

and requires your immediate attention and action."

The request to expand the footprint of the landfill is expected to be brought before the Broward County Commission for a vote. However, the determination of whether the height increase will be allowed will be made by a single County Special Magis-





Minutes of CVE CenClub Board of Directors Meeting — 5/14/24

All minutes are printed as submitted by the organization.

Present: Rita Pickar, Stanley Spitzer, Jay Baimel, Michael Rackman, Susan Dove, Arnold Klein, and Shelia Pascar. Mike Burdman, the executive director of CenClub, and Norma Taylor on Zoom from Bay Management.

Minutes:

Susan Dove moved, and Stanley Spitzer seconded the motion to waive the reading and approve the April minutes as posted on the CenClub website and printed in the Reporter. The Motion carried unanimously.

President's Comments: Rita Pickar

Rita congratulated both Lyndhurst H and Oakridge F for being the first two buildings to achieve compliance with the Community Improvement and Accreditation Committee (CAC).

Treasurer's Report: Jay Baimel

Jay gave a monthly summarized report for April. The month of April began with an operating account of \$71,673. During April, CenClub received \$908,603 and transferred \$162,807 from the reserve account. During April, CenClub dispersed \$991,713, leaving a balance in the operating checking account at the end of April \$151,370. There was \$6,473 in petty cash with total operating funds of \$157,843. The reserve account at the end of April was \$4,893,401. CenClub's total cash on April 30, 2024, was \$5,051,244. The reserve account started in April with \$5,047,814 and took in \$8,394 in interest income, transferred from the reserve account of \$162,807, ending the reserve account with \$4,893,401. The reserves are adjusted monthly as CenClub pays for scheduled upcoming significant projects and replaces them with new and budgeted board-approved projects according to the 20year capital needs plan. This valuation is the cornerstone of CenClub's long-term financial and economic planning and reinforces CenClub's commitment to ensuring sustainability and ongoing renewal of CenClub's recreational facilities. As we approach the summer of 2024 and mark the end of five years from the original assessment, the CenClub Board has voted

unanimously to authorize our professional independent appraisers to update their study to maintain a 20-year outlook. Their analysis is scheduled to begin in June. CenClub's budget and spending for capital projects and repairs planned this coming fiscal year, which started on October 1, 2023, will approach \$3.5M. For the seven months ending April 30, 2024, CenClub has dispersed almost \$2,100,000 toward this target, including \$950,000 to complete the Richmond pool and other pool furniture upgrades for four pools and begin work on the Clubhouse pool. \$157,000 for the pickleball courts, \$248,000 for the new racquetball/handball court and related land modifications required by this structure, \$244,000 deposit for mobilization costs to replace the entire Clubhouse tile roof, \$183,000 for sail shades at the Richmond pool and ten other projects aggregating \$318,000 representing safety and amenity improvements.

Interest income on operating and reserve cash balances amounted to \$61,000 for the seven months ended April 30, 2024, as we continue to benefit from CenClub's cash management practices and the higher interest rate environment. At the end of April, recreation accounts receivable was \$120,475, down from \$122.443, a decrease of \$1,968 from March 31. From the high of \$406,000 on March 31, 2020, when CenClub assumed the responsibility of collection efforts led by Ronnie Joe Terone, Property Manager, Norma Tayler and our outside attorneys who teamed up to reduce receivables by more than 70% from then until now. The total assets of CenClub Recreation Management Inc. for April were \$16,783,700, up from \$15,357,683. Total liabilities were \$4,196,801, up from \$3,604,135. As a result, CenClub members' equity (assets minus liabilities) as of April 30, 2024, was \$12,586,899, up from \$11,710,297. Stanley congratulated all who are involved in reducing the receivables; they are doing a great job. Jay added that the 70% reduction was achieved without write-offs; these are real reductions in cash. Rita thanked Jay for his report.

Executive Director Report: Mike Burdman, Executive Director

Recreation Updates:

The Clubhouse pool has been demolished, and crews work daily to remove the rubble and old paver bricks. The new pool will be a modern resort-style amenity with a ramped entry and a therapy seating area in the water. Construction is planned to take eight months to a year to complete; the Richmond pool took ten months. While the Clubhouse pool is being renovated, aquacise classes have been moved to the Richmond pool, and a schedule can be found both online and at the Clubhouse.

Sail Shade construction on the Richmond pool deck has begun. A construction fence was installed last week, and the engineered footers were being prepared. This project will take several weeks; the pool will remain open during construction.

The remodeling of the Upminster bathroom has begun. This project will take 6 to 8 weeks to complete. Once done, the bathroom will have additional stalls, be ADA compliant, and have finishes similar to those of the Richmond bathrooms.

Permits for replacing the Clubhouse roof are in. The Board selected a contractor after reviewing four proposals. The roof project will not interfere with Clubhouse activities but may affect parking and access during different phases; the community will be alerted of any changes to daily operations.

The elevator project is back on track. All equipment and materials have made it to Florida and are in storage, awaiting refurbishment. Please watch for more information to follow and how the elevator project will affect our Clubhouse operations. We look to begin this project in the middle of summer (July/August) when Clubhouse traffic is minimal.

Beginning in June or July, the Ashby pool will be resurfaced, and the pool deck and fence will be replaced. The pool will be closed during this project. The fencing will be replaced with a 6' bronze fence. The start date is unavailable; CenClub will inform the community of the closure.

Maintenance and Pools:

For April, the maintenance team completed 276 work orders, and our pool team completed 68.

The maintenance team has been busy keeping up with the general upkeep of the facilities, annual wall repairs, and interior painting of the Clubhouse. The entryway and tunnel leading to the welcome desk on the first floor have been repainted. All lights on the property have been surveyed and ordered or replaced as needed. A safety inspection has been completed on all swimming pools, and no issues were noted with the equipment or facilities. Security is actively monitoring the pools and bathhouses as well. Mike said that the air blower at the Richmond pool is being repaired today; over the weekend, someone forced the knob too far to the left; the timer is set for 30 min increments - if you turn it

more than that, it will break. Reminder of Pools Rules

- Reservations are required when having a gathering at the pools. Reservations help CenClub know who to contact if there is an issue and keep the team organized.
- Please have your ID card on you at pools and any CenClub area (pictures are not accepted).
- Food is allowed. Glass is not permitted.
- Please be courteous to your neighbors, do not play loud music, no ball playing or jumping in the pools.
- Bikes, electric bikes, and scooters are prohibited on the pool deck. Please keep them at the bike racks.
- Security officers are patrolling all areas.

Fitness Center: The fitness center offers 135 weekly classes for our residents. For a full schedule, stop by the staff office, fitness center, or our CenClub website, cenclub.com/fitness. The fitness schedule will change in May; watch for the summer schedule!

Pickleball Tournament: A pickleball tournament will be held on Wednesday, May 15, with Coach Cleo; sign-ups are complete.

Fitness Lecture with Christe Foster: Join Christine as she discusses "The Importance of Maintaining Muscle Mass and Balance as We Age" on Tuesday, June 4, from 2 pm-3 pm in GP-A. Pickleball: Take a class with Coach Cleo! She teaches beginner and intermediate/ advanced pickleball lessons at Tilford Tuesdays through Thursdays. Grab a flyer from the Staff Office or Fitness Center for the complete schedule. During the summer, the pickleball schedule will be adjusted and moved to the Clubhouse courts – Please watch for updates from our fitness center.

Personal Trainer: The fitness Center offers personal training at a fantastic rate. Stop by the fitness center today for more information and a free consultation with our staff members. Last month, there were 30 training sessions.

In regard to the Assessments Receivable on uncollected items totaling \$125,314, approximately 47% is comprised of 23 units that are over 90 days delinquent to total \$58,500.

For the month ending March 31, 2024, the Revenue was \$1,489,344 and Expenses were \$1,229,963. The Net Revenue exceeded Expenses by \$259,980. YTD Revenue was \$4,414,239 and YTD Expenses were \$3,693,306. The YTD Revenue exceeded Expenses by \$720,932.

The balance sheet shows Cash on Hand of \$5,579,711. The Assessments Receivable on uncollected items are \$112,808. Total Assets are \$6,565,961 with Total Liabilities of \$6,565,961 and Total Equity of \$4,073,521.

In regard to the Assessments Receivable on uncollected items totaling \$112,808, approximately 47% is comprised of 29 units that are over 90 days delinquent and total \$54,500.

Val expressed gratitude for everyone who attended the meeting in person and online and for taking time to find out what's happening in the Community and CVE Master Management.

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
