Main Gate "Unsafe," **Demolition** and **Reconstruction Begin** This Month

entury Village East's main guardhouse has been declared unsafe by CVE Master Management, prompting a long-awaited demolition and reconstruction project set to begin the week of January 13th. The existing guardhouse, which has served as the community's main entry point for nearly 50 years, is being replaced with a modern, state-of-the-art facility designed to enhance security, functionality, and aesthetics.

"It has to come down," said Val Smikle, Executive Director of CVE Master Management. "If it was up to me, it would have come down years ago." Smikle candidly shared with residents that he often wished the aging structure had been

knocked down by a hurricane, underscoring the urgent need for its replacement.

CVE Master Management has described the project as "necessary construction," pointing to the advanced age of the guardhouse and its inability to meet modern safety and operational standards. The new guardhouse will not only ensure a safer and more secure entryway for residents and visitors but will also streamline traffic flow with updated technology and enhanced traffic management systems.

During the construction period, the main gate will be closed to inbound and out-

New Law Aims to Protect Seniors From Fraud

 ${f A}$ new state law went into effect on January 1st that supporters say introduces an important safeguard for seniors against financial fraud. The new provision allows banks to temporarily delay fund transfers or withdrawals if fraudulent activity is suspected, giving financial institutions the time to investigate and prevent potential losses. This legislation is timely and directly addresses incidents like the one highlighted in the May 2024

issue of the CVE Reporter, where a resident of Century Village East narrowly escaped losing thousands of dollars to scammers.

The CVE Reporter detailed how David Kirstin, a resident of Century Village East, was targeted in a sophisticated scam that began with a fake computer virus alert and escalated into days of deceitful communication with a fraudulent "fraud department." The scammers convinced Kirstin to withdraw \$5,000 from his

bank account and attempted to persuade him to deposit it into a Bitcoin ATM at a nearby convenience store. Fortunately, Kirstin and his wife became suspicious before completing the transaction, and the scam was foiled. However, the incident underscores the need for stronger protections for seniors, who are often targeted due to their trust in officialsounding communications.

The new provision under SB 556 empowers banks to act as a first line of defense



in situations like Kirstin's. If bank employees detect unusual account activity or suspect fraud, they can delay the transaction and notify the account holder or their des-

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





Deerfield Beach Vice Mayor **Slams Broward County Over Mount Trashmore Expansion Plans**

eerfield Beach Vice Mayor Todd Drosky has accused the Broward County Commission of attempting to railroad through a controversial proposal to expand the landfill known as Mount Trashmore, located just down the road from Century Village East.

The expansion, requested by Waste Management,

would increase the landfill's height by 100 feet, making it a towering 325 feet tall, higher than the Statue of Liberty.

"The County is being asked to increase the height of the dump by 100 feet vertically to 325 feet, and to also expand it horizontally as well," Drosky said during a meeting inside the village. "It would be the biggest dump in the entire state of Florida, right in our backyard."

The proposal has sparked outrage among local residents, who already contend with odors, traffic, and environmental concerns from the site. Drosky sharply criticized Broward County officials for even considering the proposal, calling it a blatant disregard for the well-being of those living nearby.

"For the County to even consider raising it and expanding it is a stick in the eye to the residents who have lived here," he said. "Not only from an environmental standpoint, from a smell standpoint, to a water quality standpoint, to a traffic standpoint - pick your poison. This is not a fit for our backyard."

Residents will have an opportunity to voice their concerns at a Broward

County Commission meeting on January 28, where the proposal will be discussed. Drosky is urging residents to attend and speak out against the expansion.

"What the County is trying to do to us is meeting fatigue," Drosky said. "So you have one meeting, where you have 100 people [attending to protest the expansion]. The County says, 'Oh boy, that's a lot of people. We can't make a decision. Let's have another meeting.' Then 50 people show up to that meeting. Well, we still can't make a decision. Then you have 25 people. Then you have 10 people. Then finally the crowd is so thin that they can push it through, and it's no big deal. Don't let them do that to us."

CVE Master Management is expected to once again provide a bus to the county meeting, as it did for the last meeting on this issue.

The City of Deerfield Beach is also offering transportation for those wishing to attend. These efforts aim to encourage as many residents as possible to make their voices heard.

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The landfill, which has already grown to a significant size, has been a source of contention for years. However, this latest proposal to raise its height and expand its footprint has reignited calls for stricter oversight and accountability from Broward County.

Drosky's strong words reflect the frustration and determination of a community unwilling to back down in the face of what they see as a monumental affront to their quality of life. Residents are now mobilizing to attend the January 28 meeting and ensure Broward County officials understand the full impact of this controversial proposal.

Even as Danny's mobility slowed, his scooter became a familiar sight at Saturday morning stickball games, where he enthusiastically cheered on players. Afterward, he and Esther often met for breakfast at the CVE Diner, a weekly tradition that brought them joy and connected them to the community they loved.

Their love story was a shining example of partnership, perseverance, and passion. At nearly 96 years old, Esther and Danny had experienced the highs and lows of life together while maintaining their enthusiasm and positive outlook. Whether supporting one another through challenges or engaging with friends and neighbors, they inspired everyone around them with their vitality and enduring love.

As they celebrated their 75th wedding anniversary, Es-

bound traffic, but CVE Master Management has implemented several measures to minimize disruptions. The East Gate hours will be extended to 24/7, and the Plaza exit near the front gate will operate from 6:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Additional security personnel, equipped with portable tablets, will be stationed at the East and West Gates to expedite visitor processing and reduce wait times.

The new facility will also include a main security office, creating a centralized hub for all safety operations within

the village. This upgrade reflects CVE Master Management's commitment to maintaining a high standard of security while improving convenience for residents.

The timing of the project was chosen carefully to avoid weather-related delays during Florida's rainy season and to minimize overlap with the anticipated expansion of SW 10th Street. Construction is expected to take six months, ensuring the new guardhouse is completed before the busy fall season when many seasonal residents return to the village.

Residents and visitors can be assured that emergency vehicles will continue to have unrestricted access to the main gate during construction.

As construction begins, the new guardhouse represents not just a safer and more efficient entry point but also a milestone in Century Village East's ongoing commitment to progress and excellence.

ignated trusted contact. This delay provides crucial time to verify the legitimacy of the transaction and potentially prevent irreversible losses. For Kirstin, a delay like this could have stopped the scam in its tracks as soon as he attempted to withdraw funds.

Fraud targeting seniors, particularly those in retirement communities like Century Village East, has become increasingly prevalent. The *CVE Reporter* article noted that bank employees in the area have reported a rise in similar cases among local residents. By giving financial institutions the authority to pause suspicious

transactions, SB 556 directly addresses this alarming trend and offers added peace of mind to communities with a high concentration of retirees.

Residents of Century Village East and similar communities are encouraged to stay vigilant and familiarize themselves with the new law. Banks are advising account

holders to designate trusted contacts and discuss potential fraud scenarios with family members. This new protection, coupled with greater awareness, represents a significant step forward in the fight against financial fraud targeting seniors.

As the law takes effect, cases like Kirstin's may be-

come less common, providing a critical layer of security for seniors navigating an increasingly complex digital and financial world. For residents of Century Village East, SB 556 is more than just a new law—it's a shield against the kind of predatory schemes that have already threatened their neighbors.

Why CVE's Main Gate Project Was Scheduled Last

As construction begins on Century Village
East's new main guardhouse, many residents have wondered why the main gate renovation was prioritized last among the village's gate improvement projects. According to CVE Master Management, the decision was part of a carefully planned strategy to minimize disruptions and better manage traffic flow during the construction process.

Before their renovations, both the East and West Gates had a significant limitation: each gate had only one inbound lane, shared by both residents and visitors. This setup often created bottlenecks during peak hours, with traffic slowing as security processed incoming vehicles. To address this, the plan prioritized redesigning the East and West Gates first, creating two inbound lanes at each location—one dedicated to residents and the other to visitors.

"The sequencing of these projects was always about minimizing inconvenience for residents and visitors," said CVE Master Management Executive Director Val Smikle. "The East and West Gates needed to be redesigned to handle more traffic before we could move forward with the main gate renovation."

The redesign was implemented to ensure the East and West Gates could handle increased traffic when the main gate closes for construction. With the majority of vehicles already entering the village through the West Gate (which handles roughly 70%

of traffic) and the East Gate soon to operate 24/7 during construction, the improved layouts allow these gates to absorb the additional load more efficiently.

CVE Master Management explained that tackling the main gate first would have created logistical challenges, as the single-lane configurations at the East and West Gates could not have accommodated the extra traffic without significant delays. By addressing those gates first, the community now has a more robust

traffic management system in place, making the main gate closure far less disruptive.

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With construction on the main gate set to begin, village officials say the upgraded gates will successfully manage the increased traffic load, ensuring that residents continue to enjoy smooth access to the village even as the main gate undergoes its long-awaited transformation.

Main Gate Handles Just 30% of CVE Traffic, Says CVE Master Management

While much attention is focused on the upcoming closure of Century Village East's main gate for the construction of a new guardhouse, CVE Master Management reports that only 30% of all traffic into the

village actually uses the main gate. The majority of vehicles—approximately 70%—enter through the West Gate, highlighting the critical role it plays in managing the community's overall traffic flow.

the importance of efficient operations at the West Gate during the main gate's temporary closure, set to begin this month. With the bulk of traffic already flowing through the West Gate, it is expected to shoulder an even greater load

during construction.

with portable tablets will be stationed at the gate to expedite visitor processing and reduce wait times. These improvements aim to ensure that traffic flows as smoothly as possible during this transitional period.

Took board through the proposed amendments for input and made changes accordingly. Oct. 15th Board adopted the revisions, and the Articles were certified on Sunbiz.org 10/30/24. Please note our 617 corporation is not required to register its bylaws in Broward County. We operate under those new documents today.

(SDP) retainer where for \$1,500 any association willing to accept the STANDARD DOCUMENTS as written, could sign the retainer, KBR would prepare the documents for the association to send to its membership for vote and receive assistance with getting the Articles filed with the state and remaining documents registered with Broward County. Those associators, wishing to customize the documents, have a clean, free of all long-term lease language, legally up-to date set to take to any attorney and pay to alter them as they wish. Depending on how much change they desire, they likely will save in legal costs. See more regarding Advantages of Adopting the SDP "As Is" in this January Reporter insert.

Treasurers Workshop was well-received and dealt with current issues facing association secretaries and how best to accomplish the needs of the position.

Association Guidance and Education: COOCVE remains often called upon by boards

and their members to provide personal guidance and education on how to improve their communication and operations to work together more effectively and harmoniously.

President's Forum continues as a highly successful vehicle for boards to get together and talk about common issues and share resolutions. This year more than ever, associations, large and small, sought and shared contractor info and ways to save, sorely needed during 2024's unprecedented numbers of legal, structural, and mandated changes.

Election Committee is hard at work as this report is being written, preparing for the 2025 election. The Association Representative Board of COOCVE has the critical job of voting and we hope for strong participation. See more election details in this January Reporter insert.

Area Chair Committee has 15 out of 21 Area Chairs currently. Since early 2024 no one has volunteered to chair the committee. In 1989, the Reporter was the only community communication device. The Council of Area Chairs was formed to help COOCE disseminate information between Reporter issues. Area Chairs volunteer to run for the position, call for a meeting of associations in their area, and those associations vote her/him in as they wish. Elected Area Chairs

vote for their Chairperson to lead the committee. We await area election results.

Website Renovation is in progress to offer our community more helpful information in ways they prefer to obtain it. COOCVE.com is a critical communication tool that needs to adapt to serve our changing CVE community as it organizationally, culturally, socially and economically changes.

COOCVE Office: February 1st to December 10th, the COOCVE office served approximately 215 visitors (1.3 per day) and 169 callers (1.2 per day) on various COOCVE related topics and resident emails are increasing. Prior to moving to our beautiful location a few years ago, for 10+ years the office was open 1 or 2 days a week for a few hours and communicated primarily via email and phone. We now have good data to explain why. Our revised 2025 office hours will be posted on COOCVE.com.

For 2025, our volunteer officers will focus on doing what we do best and do so within reasonable volunteer hours. Your COOCVE team is adapting to what CVE is telling us they want and need. We look forward to conducting more research to find and provide more recommendations to help improve the quality of life of our boards an owners and offer more education programs.

Advantages of Adopting the Standard Document Package (SDP) "As Is"

Associations that adopt the SDP, as is, have more in store by way of potential benefits. Sharing the same documents means you belong to an elite Standard Documents Group (SDG) and can potentially benefit in many ways. Here are just a few of those benefits:

- · Reduced shared cost when amendments need to be made in the future.
- · COOCVE providing document education programs to all SDG boards and owners.
- COOCVE will be working on providing a set of "legally checked" RULES. Any
 association can adopt them as is or alter them as needed. The SDG, because
 their documents are the same, can apply these RULES to their associations
 as needed, knowing there is no conflict with their documents. And, as we all
 learned, RULES can be adopted and changed by the board and do not need
 to be registered in Broward.
- COOCVE will be working together with the SDG on possible options for having a single board to serve as many SDG associations that wish to participate. Having a group of Associations with enough units (300+) under management, operating under the same documents and governed by a properly trained and experienced board, can do much to make life easier, more joyful and hopefully more economical for all involved.
- With enough association units under a single SDG board, that board has the
 opportunity to contract for more comprehensive property management
 services to fully manage the group more equitably. This type of management
 lessens the work for the board by providing comprehensive customer service
 to owners rather than the board handling almost everything.
- By having associations joining under one board and being managed by one higher level management service provider, the associations can gain an economy of scale to potentially save on all the most expensive things, i.e., insurance, engineering, construction/repair costs, roofs, painting, catwalks, windows and doors, elevators, laundry equipment, and more.

For those associations wishing to decline the SDP retainer package and customize the prepared documents, they may do so at their own expense, take them to any attorney they wish and pay for whatever changes they wish to make. Depending on how many changes each wishes to make, these legally up-to-date documents, with all the recreation lease language removed, can help minimize the cost to customize them.

Given how long board members wish or plan to continue serving, they may want to consider the short and & long-term advantages of adopting the SDP as is. It may be worth considering advantages that might serve your association today, but serve even more in the long-term.

My term as your commissioner after 8 years is up in March. I have been training my replacement as to what is expected from your commissioner. Dan Shanetsky will make a fine replacement.





h, let me tell you the story of a game called stickball, a cherished pastime here in Century Village. Stickball games are held every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday at 9 a.m. in the bus parking lot. Additionally, the French Alliance takes to the field on Sunday mornings, boasting an excellent team of their own.

Stickball began in Century Village eight years ago and has steadily grown in popularity ever since. The village's version of stickball focuses solely on hitting and fielding—no running of bases. Hits are scored as singles, doubles, triples, or home runs based on where the ball lands (as long as it isn't caught). Games are played over seven or nine innings, with players using the Spaulding Hi Bounce ball, which is similar to the now-unavailable classic Spaulding ball. Fans are always welcome to join the fun and cheer for their favorite teams.

A brief history of stickball reveals its rich regional variations. In New York, stickball was played on the streets. In Boston, players competed against walls, while in Philadelphia, a similar game called Half Ball emerged. Traditionally, bats were fashioned from household broom handles. Today, players craft their bats from wooden dowels, keeping the spirit of the game alive.

So, come join us! Whether

as a player or a fan, stickball is a great way to connect with neighbors and relive a piece of nostalgic Americana. As the tune goes:

"Take me out to the stickball game,

Take me out so I can play. So it's one, two strikes, you're out,

Of the old stickball game!"



Minutes of CVE CenClub Board of Directors Meeting – 12/10/24

All minutes are printed as submitted by the organization.

Present: Rita Pickar, Stanley Spitzer, Jay Baimel, Michael Rackman, Susan Dove, Shelia Pascar, Arnold Klein, Mike Burdman, the executive director of Cen-Club, and Norma Taylor with Bay Management.

Minutes:

Stanley Spitzer moved, and Shelia Pascar seconded the motion to waive the reading and approve the November minutes as posted on the CenClub website and printed in the Reporter. The Motion carried unanimously.

President's Comments: Rita Pickar

Rita welcomed back residents who had yet to spend the summer at CVE. Last night's show with Jane Curry was fantastic, and she will be back next year! The count limit for Bingo, located in the party room, has been raised to 350; be sure to get there by 5 pm

Treasurer's Report: Jay Baimel

Jay reported that for November 2024, in the operating account at the end of October 2024, there was \$222,831. During November, CenClub received \$1,213,025. CenClub dispersed \$849,796 and transferred \$527,837. At the end of November, the operating account balance was \$58,223. In addition to petty cash of \$7,381, there were total operating funds of \$65,604 and a reserve balance of \$3,175,092. As of November 30, 2024, CenClub Recreation Management has \$3,240,696 in total cash. The reserve account at the end of October was \$2,642,048. In November, CenClub earned \$5,207 in interest. There were net transfers from the reserve to the operating account of \$527,837; therefore, at the end of November, the reserve balance was \$3,175,092.

The month-end balance in the sweep reserve account consists of deposits below \$250,000 in 15 different banks to ensure maximum insurance protection under the FDIC guidelines. The outside CPA firm is finalizing its examination of the September 30, 2024, financial statements; therefore, we expect the full audit report shortly. CenClubs' new fiscal year began on October 1, 2024.

As a reminder, beginning

January 2025, the adjusted Cen-Club dues will be a uniform amount of \$110 per month for all owners—the lowest of the three monthly payments.

During October and November 2024, CenClub dispersed about \$1.1 million for capital projects budgeted in 2024 and 2025. Most notably, \$400,000 was spent on the Clubhouse pool and \$300,000 on replacing the air conditioning unit in the Clubhouse east wing. Interest income for the two months ended November 30, 2024, amounted to almost \$12,000. Net recreation receivables were \$118,117, down from \$118,356, a modest decrease of \$239 since October 31. After our outside CPA's annual year-end audit adjustments and reclassifications, the following balance sheet totals have been updated to November 2024. Total assets were \$9,245,430, and liabilities were \$704,218. As a result, CenClub members' equity was \$8,541,212.

Executive Director Report: Mike Burdman, Executive Director

Recreation Updates Completed projects:

The construction of the pickleball sail shade is complete! This project will shade the patio seating areas between the courts. We hope our resident pickleball players enjoy this new feature.

Projects underway:

The Clubhouse pool is under construction, and the final plumbing has passed inspection. We are also working on tile, pool equipment, a new paver deck, fencing, and pool plaster. This new resort-style pool will be a splash for our residents, and we promise to open it as soon as possible!

Our Clubhouse roof project is also underway. All areas of the tile are being replaced. The old materials have been removed, and new boards and tar paper have already been installed. Inspections have been completed, and the tile should arrive any day now. We hope to have the entire project done before the end of January.

Mike showed a short video on the progress of the projects. **Upcoming projects**:

Lyndhurst South Pool and Upminster Pool will have the roofs replaced on the bathhouses. We are currently in the permitting phase of these projects.

The main AC units for the clubhouse have been ordered and will take 36 weeks to build.

Maintenance and Pools:

Our maintenance team completed 212 work orders through November, and our pool team completed 61.

- All lights on the property have been surveyed and ordered or replaced as needed.
- Two pool lights were replaced: one at Durham and one at Ashby.
- Six handrail covers were added to the long rail at the Richmond Pool.
- All six rusty BBQ grills have been replaced with new ones
- An additional cornhole set was added, and the area was refurbished for play.
- All swimming pools have been inspected for safety, and no issues with equipment or facilities were noted.
- Security is actively monitoring the pools and bathhouses as well.

Reminder of Pools Rules

- Please use the restrooms. A contaminated pool means a closed pool.
- Reservations are required when having a gathering at the pools. Reservations help CenClub know whom to contact if there is an issue and keep the team organized.
- Please have your ID card with you at the pools and in any CenClub area (photos are not accepted).
- Food is allowed. Glass is not permitted.
- Please be courteous to your neighbors; do not play loud music, and do not play ball or jump in the pools.
- Bikes, electric bikes, and scooters are prohibited on the pool deck. Please keep them at the bike racks.

Fitness Center: True strength training equipment was installed on November 27. It includes one leg press, a calf raise standard stack, a glute press, a deltoid raise, and two adjustable weight benches.

8-Ball Billiards Tournament: The tournament occurred on November 18, 19, and 20. The winners were Gio, who took first place; Bernard, who took second place; and Lucy, who took third place.

Mike thanked all the players for participating and

Cindy for running another successful event.

Pickleball Lessons: The Tilford Courts will be resurfaced in the next two weeks. Pickleball lessons have been relocated to Clubhouse courts 1 and 2. Master Management is expected to complete this project by December 19th. During the resurfacing, Tilford lessons will be held at the Clubhouse. Additional sessions have been added to address the influx of residents: Tuesday from 7:30 am to 11:30 am-beginner, Wednesday from 7:30 am to 11:30 amintermediate, and Thursday from 7:30 am to 11:30 am—intermediate/advanced.

CenClub 5K: We are excited to announce the inaugural CenClub 5K Fun Run on Sunday, January 19. This noncompetitive run (or walk) will begin at 7:45 am near the new racquetball court. The route goes around Century Blvd., with several water stations throughout the Village. Registration is open, and the event costs just \$10. Participants will receive a T-shirt, snacks, and a completion medal!

Personal Training: As a reminder, personal training is available at a fantastic rate in the fitness center! Stop by the center today for more information and a free consultation with our staff.

Fitness Equipment Orientation: Sign up in the fitness center for this hour-long session. One of our fitness experts, Rocco or Cindy, will walk you through the center and explain the functions and safety of the equipment.

Lifestyle and Entertainment:

Tickets for season shows are now on sale. Tickets for these shows are just \$18, a slight increase from previous years, and are available for purchase online and at the box office during business hours: 9 am – 4 pm Monday through Friday, and one hour each Sunday before shows begin. As a reminder, all shows start promptly at 8 pm unless noted. If you are bringing a guest, please ensure they have a ticket and a form of photo ID and that they are checked in at a security desk. You must accompany your guests; they will only be allowed in with a resident. Please remember that the theater

is a fragrance-free zone; be aware of others with asthma or breathing problems. Shorts are not permitted; this is to preserve the elegance of our beautiful theater. No food or drinks are allowed in the theater. These rules are not new; they are posted on the ticket window website and printed on the back of all tickets.

Minutes of the CVE Master Management Company, Inc. Board Meeting – 9/19/24

All minutes are printed as submitted by the organization.

Board President, Eli Okun, called to order the open meeting of the elected volunteer Board of Directors of CVE Master Management Company Co., Inc. at 9:30 AM.

A sign-up sheet is available in the back of the room for those interested in speaking at Open Mic. Online Zoom participants may raise their hand at the end of the meeting to be called on or sign-up in chat. Each speaker will have a 3-minute time limit to address the Board. Zoom and chat and we will also call upon you.

Absent - Michael Routburg Following the Pledge of Allegiance, a moment of silence was held for those who gave their lives in service to preserve our democracy.

Meeting Minutes: (09:32:22 a.m.)

The Board unanimously approved the Minutes of the September 19, 2024, Board Meeting; the September 19, 2024, Executive Session, the September 26, 2024, Executive Session; the October 31, 2024, Executive Session; and the November 7, 2024, Executive Session as presented.

Eli explained that the large number of Meeting Minutes was due to the October meeting being cancelled due to Hurricane Milton.

Guest Speaker - Howard Sapper, Park Supervisor, Office of Public Safety, Deerfield Beach:

Howard explained the Beach Parking Pass Registration Process that began November 1. Since CVE Residents purchase a large number of parking passes, he wanted to provide Residents with the opportunity to ask questions and receive assistance prior to the start date of January 1, 2025. Howard announced that he and his colleague John would be set up at the Clubhouse from 10:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. to help with gathering necessary documents and answer any questions.

Two handouts will be available; 1 that outlines the 2025 parking permit, to include the cost that is \$100.00 for the year of 2025, as well as highlights important changes:

Proof of residency - The CVE ID card will no longer be accepted as proof of residency due to the lack of a date on the card. Proof of residency will consist of a utility bill (FPL or cable) or recent tax bill. The handout also includes office contact information that includes a telephone number and email address.

The 2nd handout lists the 4 specific parking locations and other information. It is important to note the permit

is nontransferrable. To obtain a permit, Residents must provide all of the following 3 required items - driver's license, vehicle registration, and proof of residency and all 3 must have the same name listed on the proof of residency - all 3 must match.

Again, Howard and John will be in the Clubhouse today from 10:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at a table in the lobby next to the theatre.

President's Report - Eli Okun: (09:33:54 a.m.)

1) CVE Master Management Coupon Update 2025 -

The Board will vote on the 2025 Master Management budget during New Business. MM recognizes that most Residents are facing higher monthly costs in their buildings and has worked diligently to reduce the expenses it manages. To keep the 2025 coupon as low as possible, MM decided to delay some smaller projects. Despite increases in security, utilities, transportation, and insurance costs, the monthly coupon for 2025 will only rise by \$4, from \$168 to \$172. The Board has done an excellent job thoroughly reviewing every line item and cutting unnecessary expenses.

2) Utility Boxes - **(09:37:42 a.m.)**

The box wrap project consisting of boxes on Century Boulevard and the righthand turn lane on Military Trail is now complete. Eli expressed gratitude to the Utility Wrap Committee members Caryl Berner, Laura Routburg, and Barbara Gerson, along with MM Project Manager, Denis Barreto, for their excellent work. The results are impressive and contribute to the beautification of the Community.

3) Main Guardhouse Construction Update - (09:38:10 a.m.)

Eli was pleased to announce the new guardhouse construction at the front gate is expected to start the week of December 9th. During this time, all inbound and outbound traffic will be closed except for emergency vehicles. However, you will still be able to exit through the Plaza Shopping Center between 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. The project is expected to take about 5 to 6 months. Throughout this period, MM will work diligently to ensure traffic continues to run smoothly in and out of the Village. The East and West gates will remain open 24/7, officers with handheld tablets will be assigned to help expedite the entry process, especially during peak hours.

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Adjustments will be made as necessary. After waiting years for permit approval, MM is eager to proceed with the project. Further delays would only lead to higher costs, and with the rainy season approaching, it was clear that starting the project now was the best choice.

Eli welcomed everybody back who have recently returned to the Village, and wished a happy and safe Thanksgiving. He stated the financial reports were combined for the months of September and October, as a result of Hurricane Milton.

Treasurer's Report - Barry Warhoftig: (09:40:08 a.m.)

1) Barry welcomed everyone back to Century Village -Treasurers Report (September & October 2024 Combined).

For the previous 2 months, the Revenue was \$2,920,032 and Expenses were \$2,921,180. The Net Expenses exceeded Revenue by \$1,148. YTD Revenue was \$14,827,079 and YTD Expenses were \$13,501,950. The YTD Revenue exceeded Expenses by \$1,325,129. The balance sheet shows Cash on Hand of \$5,421,312. The Assessments Receivable on uncollected items are \$104,225. Total Assets are \$6,800,548 with Total Liabilities of \$2,093,221 and Total Equity of \$4,707,327.

Eli pointed out that the available cash seems unusually high, as MM has not yet paid for several newly initiated projects, including the Hillsboro Boulevard wall and the front Main Gate. Once these expenses are paid, the cash reserve will decrease substantially. He said that MM operates on a break-even basis.

Executive Director's Report - Vallen Smikle: (09:42:16 a.m.)

Val welcomed everyone present and on-line and expressed gratitude for their participation, highlighting the importance of staying informed about Community developments and Village projects.

1) Technology Update -

a. Sinkhole

A sinkhole was discovered a few months ago near the Durham V Association. Immediate action was taken to address the issue, including repairing the pipe that was encroaching on the road, preventing the situation from worsening. Landscaping remediation will happen this week to beautify the area. Val expressed gratitude to Robert Streather for collaborating with the civil engineering vendor, Murphy Construction, to quickly identify and resolve the problem.

While the grassy area isn't frequently walked on, it is a location where some people fish, and had the sinkhole gone un-

noticed, it could have caused significant damage. Proactive measures are beneficial for everyone. The Community will continue to be monitored, including camera inspections of drain pipes, to prevent similar issues in the future.

b. Signage Project -(09:43:38 a.m.)

The current project involves improving wayfinding signs and identification markers for the post office, which the signage has not been updated in over 30 years. Many longtime postal employees have retired, and the new staff rely on GPS, so MM is installing clearer markers to help them find buildings and deliver mail more efficiently. The smaller print signs will be replaced with larger letters. Val requested patience as the work is expected to be completed by spring.

c. Central Park -

(09:44:17 a.m.)

Work on Parcel 2, located near the Ellesmere and Century Boulevard intersection, is progressing. This area, situated on the route to the office where the bridge connects Ellesmere and the west area, across from the park in the Keswick area, is expected to be completed by the end of December. The project includes pavers, landscaping, lighting, and a fountain, creating a joyful and tranquil space for people to gather and relax. This first phase spans just over an acre and a half.

Next, MM will begin work on Parcel 4 located behind the Grantham, Ashby, and Berkshire areas. This 15acre project includes several improvements, such as bike and walking paths, and a land bridge connecting Berkshire to the community side with an attached gazebo, providing another excellent gathering space. Additionally, there will be fitness areas and a putting green designed by CenClub. The plans for Parcel 4 will be presented to the city on December 14th, with the aim to complete this phase by the end of next year. It's a wonderful transformation of the former golf course land into a space for new activities and community engagement.

d. Pickleball - (09:45:42 a.m.) For pickleball players, there 2 courts behind the Le Club Facility--courts 9 and 10 and will be resurfaced from December 9th to 20th. Cen-Club has arranged for players to use other courts during this 2-week closure. Since the courts were installed in 2019, MM determined it was time for resurfacing to ensure the best experience and value.

e. Charging Station -(09:46:23 a.m.)

Val reminded everyone that an email blast was recently sent out. If you're not signed up for the emails, please reach out to Customer Service to enroll in the Insider, email updates, and alerts. Regarding the recent update about the charging station, Val was happy to announce that it is now operational again. If you have an electric vehicle, feel free to use it. Up to 2 vehicles can charge simultaneously.

f. Shed (09:46:50 a.m.)

Val said MM considered adding a utility shed to protect some of our vehicles from the weather. However, after receiving feedback from several Associations expressing concerns that the shed might be viewed as an eyesore, it was decided not to move forward with that location. He reiterated there would be no shed built in the preserve area.

g. Community Beautification - (09:47:38 a.m.)

A fountain behind lslewood Dis currently being repaired and under warranty. It should be operational by the end of the month or the first week of December.

h. Landscaping -

The maintenance team is actively working on landscaping, aiming to complete all tasks before Thanksgiving. This will ensure that when your guests arrive, they'll be greeted by beautifully landscaped entrances at all 3 gates. Annuals will be planted as part of MM's ongoing efforts to keep the area looking great.

h. Holiday Lighting -(09:48:11 a.m.)

Holiday lighting will also be turned on that week, ensuring the gates are beautifully illuminated for the holiday season.

i. Pressure Washing -(09:48:21 a.m.)

Additionally, the maintenance team will be pressure washing sidewalks, benches, bus shelters, and ADA pads throughout the common areas. MM is committed to not only installing these features but also maintaining them; this work will continue periodically throughout this month and next.

j. Main Gate Construction -(09:48:38 a.m.)

MM is pleased to announce that construction at the Main Gate will begin the week of December 9th. Notifications will be sent out via email blasts and notification cards advising Residents to use to use the other gates during this time and advise their guests. Additional personnel will be stationed in those areas to help manage traffic and avoid any delays, so there's no need for concern. MM has successfully handled traffic at the other 2 gates. While entry through the plaza gate into CVE will not be permitted, you can still exit the Community through that gate toward Hillsboro Boulevard without obstruction.

Val reminded everyone that many of the vendors working

in the Community are here to help and serve both Residents and their guests. He urged Residents to encourage their guests to treat the vendors with kindness and patience. They are here to enforce policies and keep things running smoothly. Kindly provide your ID to transportation and security when asked.

Transdev - General Manager - Craig Garcia: (09:51:01 a.m.)

1) Transportation Report a. Bus Safety -

Craig pointed out Transdev has driven a total of 288,000 miles in Century Village over the past year without any injuries or damage to CVE property. Only 2 non-preventable accidents were reported, both with no injuries and minimal bus damage. This success is no coincidence. It's the result of trained professionals receiving guidance from Transdev worldwide. The drivers are thoroughly trained to deliver safe service. Safety is the number one goal in all of all of Transdev operations worldwide.

b. Seat Belts -

Craig reminded the Residents while seated on the bus to keep their seat belts on at all times. You never know when the driver will start or stop, so remain seated and keep your seat belt fastened while the bus is in motion. Please be cooperative and respectful with the drivers if they ask you to secure your wheelchair or assist you in any way, they are looking out for your safety. It's important to ensure that everything inside the bus is secure, as items can become projectiles if the driver has to stop suddenly. For example, an unsecured walker could fly through the windshield. Work together to ensure everyone's safety during the journey.

c. Bus Schedule -

Craig welcomed the seasonal Residents back. He reminded everyone that the bus schedule changed and encouraged them to review the updates that were sent out last month. For any questions regarding changes, Residents were encouraged to contact Craig.

d. Express Bus -

The Express Bus service was relaunched and connects directly to Publix by the Deerfield Beach Mall, as well as a stop at JJ Farms off Hillsboro Boulevard, a great place for fresh produce specials and Kosher options, which will run Monday through Friday, 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. These services are available for everyone to take advantage of. If they are not used, they may be discontinued, something MM aims to prevent. Craig said the support extends beyond Century Village benefiting the surrounding areas and shopping at local establishments who in turn help keep business thriving.

e. Bus Maintenance

Beginning Monday morning, Dickinson's Fleet will be with us to manage the maintenance of the buses, from routine preventive care to major repairs such as engine replacements. Unlike when the buses were sent to Ford, their team will now work directly in the shop, assuming full responsibility for maintenance and ensuring the fleet stays operational on a daily basis.

f. Identification -

In the past, bus riders were required to have a CVE ID to use the buses. However, starting immediately, a valid driver's license with a photo will also be accepted, as long as it is not expired and reflects your CVE address. Residents are still encouraged to carry their CVE ID. Again, make sure your license is up to date and includes your CVE address, as Canadian or non-Village addresses will not be accepted. Please show respect for the bus drivers and cooperate to help maintain safety in the Community.

For assistance, call Craig at 954-203-1312, available 24/7, or contact CustomerService@ ccvedb.com or by calling 954-421-5566. Val also forgot in his greeting/exit to wish everyone a happy Thanksgiving and to enjoy their families at this time of the year.

Allied Universal Security - Security Director - Christopher Kelley: (09:57:00 a.m.)

1) Village Security Report a. Safety Around the Community -

Always come to a full stop at stop signs and yield to the vehicle on your right if both vehicles arrive simultaneously.

b. Bulk Trash -

Bulk trash goes out on Tuesday for Wednesday pickup. Placing bulk trash out after Wednesday's pickup is not only unsightly but may lead to code enforcement being notified, potentially resulting in a violation fine of up to \$500 per day. Security is responsible for monitoring, documenting, and reporting improper trash disposal. Please be considerate and watch out for your neighbors to help maintain the beauty of CVE.

c. Bar Codes -

As you approach the gate arms, there are stop signs indicating that vehicles must stop before proceeding. This gives the card readers enough time to scan the barcodes and lift the arm. Please avoid tailgating, as the gate arms are designed for 1 car at a time. Allow the arm to fully rise, come down, as it scans the next barcode. The gates open and close slowly for safety reasons. 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not lift and an officer requests your CVE ID, please provide it. This ID confirms your residency. Chris instructs officers to explain that the CVE ID is like a gold card, granting access to the property and Clubhouse. It's quick and easy for officers to verify, as it includes your photo and address, ensuring fast entry. Please don't be upset when they ask for ID; they are simply do-

ing their job to maintain the safety of the Community.

d. BSO Report -

The BSO report for the month of November highlights the importance of stopping at stop signs, as 17 violations were issued last month for not stopping, including one for driving without a license and another for tailgating. Please remember to always carry your driver's license with you.

In response to Member inquiry, Chris explained that

the BSO report is a summary of officer reports compiled by the administrator. It does not include a breakdown of how many tickets were issued to Residents and visitors.






